Milan 2018

The theme for this year's SRN conference, to be held at Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore in Milan, is the relationship between cinema and television storytelling. Registrations are now open for the conference which runs from September 13-15, 2018. Organizers urge early registration (fee increases after 31 March) and emphasize that early booking for accommodation is wise as Milan will be very busy around that time. The 2017 SRN conference was held at the University of Otago in Dunedin in the South Island of New Zealand. SRN Awards

Members of the Executive Council are developing a plan for annual Screenwriting Research Awards to commence in 2019. It is envisaged that these awards will be decided by an independent panel of judges and that nominations from a wide range of sources will be encouraged, the key being the work's contribution to screenwriting research and knowledge. The awards will be formally proposed at the Annual General Meeting to be held during the conference in Milan in September 2018.

Screenwriting Archives and Resources Project (SARP)

Ian Macdonald sent out a recent call on behalf of the Executive Council for volunteers to provide data on screenwriting resources held by archives or related sources. The intention is to establish a database, to be published on the SRN website, of these resources and Ian reports that he has had considerable feedback already from members in several countries. The Screenwriting Research Network is a research group consisting of scholars, reflective practitioners and practice-based researchers interested in research on screenwriting. The aim is to rethink the screenplay in relation to its histories, theories, values and creative practices.

The network commenced in 2006 within the Louis Le Prince Research Centre, at the Institute of Communication Studies (ICS), University of Leeds.

During the last twelve years the network has grown rapidly. Yearly conferences have attracted a growing number of people around the world to share experiences and discuss problematics of screenwriting research.

The conferences have taken place in Leeds (2008), Helsinki (2009), Copenhagen (2010), Brussels (2011), Sydney (2012), Madison, Wisconsin (2013) Potsdam-Babelsberg (2014), London (2015), Leeds (2016) and Dunedin, NZ (2017). The eleventh annual conference will take place in Milan in September 2018.
