Books Chapters Articles Our esteemed judges, Carmen Sofia Brenes, Lee Kreiner Wilson and Garrabost Jayalakshmi are happy to announce the winners of our Book Awards in 2024. They also added this comment:

"The year 2024 has been remarkably productive in terms of publications, both in books and articles. Selecting the winners was no easy task. We would like to take this opportunity to highlight the transnational and transcultural aspects present in the winning book, as well as in some of the articles submitted for the competition.

As jurors of the SRN Awards, we celebrate the diverse backgrounds of the authors, the variety of topics, and the range of perspectives addressed. After thoroughly reading and evaluating all submissions, we reached a unanimous decision to grant the following awards"





The winning edited book by Rosamund Davies, Paolo Russo and Claus Tieber's Palgrave Handbook of Screenwriting Studies is described in this way: 'Bringing together 44 authors, the Palgrave Handbook is, as its preface announces, a comprehensive

collection of research that demonstartes the state of the art in a certain field. The editors have successfully compiled a wide range of perspectives and approaches, showcasing the breadth and strength of contemporary screenwriting studies. While the chapters inevitably vary in detail and depth, the book as a whole is undoubtedly a milestone in advancing screenwriting studies research.'

The best journal article went to **Gabriel M. Paletz's article in The Soundtrack 15** (Screenwriting Sound and Music), pp. 61–75. This article is described in this way:

'This fascinating article challenges the traditional approach of sound being "minimally written or written out" of screenplays, advocating instead for the intentional writing of sound into scripts. This approach could greatly benefit students—one common issue in students of screenwriting is the poor use of sound, and this article offers valuable insights on how to rectify that. It is well-researched and provides practical examples for screenwriting teachers and writers on incorporating music into scripts.'

Teaching Innovation Awards 2024

Dee Hughes, at Bournemouth University, also won an award for applying 'Team-based learning (TBL) to screenwriting instruction'.

ILUMINACE SPECIAL SCREENWRITING ISSUE

Call for Papers

I<u>luminace: The Journal of Film Theory, History, and Aesthetics</u>

Iluminace is a **peer-reviewed academic journal** for scholarly reflection on **cinema and audiovisual media**. It emphasizes original research and interdisciplinary approaches, focuses on international authors and readers, and welcomes both traditional articles as well as articles with videoessays.

Since the last issue of Iluminace focused on screenwriting (4/2014), the field has experienced significant changes. Major challenges, particularly in the USA, have included financial remuneration for screenwriters, job opportunities, and the rise of artificial intelligence.

These issues culminated in another WGA strike, which garnered support from regional screenwriting associations worldwide. Screenwriting studies have adapted, expanding their focus to include regional approaches, short formats, and VR, demonstrating a broadening scope for screenwriters.

The 2024 Screenwriting Research Network Conference in the Czech Republic, themed "A Conversation Beyond the Script," explored the formal elements of dialogue, voice, and the evolving craft of screenwriting. We invite contributions that examine dialogues in scripts, filmmakers' conversations during development, and negotiations between screenwriters and production companies. Submissions may address traditional writing methods or new technologies like AI and VR.

We welcome **abstracts** of 250 words and a short bio of 150 words, which should be sent to lucie.cesalkova@nfa.cz, jan.trnka@nfa.cz, and jan.cernik@upol.cz **by November 15, 2024**.

Decisions will be communicated by December 15, 2024, and full articles are due by February 15, 2025. Detailed submission guidelines are available on our journal's website.

AR@K TRUTH, REALITY AND ARTISTIC INVENTION

Call for Papers

AR@K 2025, 17-18 March

"Artistic Research at Kristiania" - AR@K - is an annual, cross-disciplinary symposium for artistic research hosted by Kristiania University College in Oslo. The international, open symposium spans two days and in 2025 AR@K will be held for the seventh time.

The tension between art and reality has been a central theme of debate since the time of Plato and Aristotle. While Plato warned of the falsity inherent in representations of reality, Aristotle argued that humans have a natural need for such representations, coining the concept of mimesis as vital to our wellbeing. This tension between truth and artistic invention continues to shape creative work across disciplines.

Art inevitably draws from reality, yet it is through artistic invention that new forms of truth—whether affective, poetic, or metaphorical—are created. This interplay between imagination and reality, however, also presents the potential for deception. In today's "post-truth" era, manipulated facts and invented truths challenge the arts, leading to new questions about the artist's role in shaping perceived realities.

For the upcoming AR@K 25 symposium, we invite artists, researchers, and academics to reflect on how truth, reality, and art intersect in their fields. Possible topics include the methods and ethics of representing reality, the boundaries between realism and truth-seeking, and the impact of generative AI on artistic practices. We welcome contributions from a variety of disciplines including film, music, dance, visual arts, and literature.

Abstracts of up to 200 words, including a title, affiliation, and a short bio (max 100 words), should be submitted in PDF format to arak@kristania.no by November 25th, 2024. Responses will be communicated by **December 15th, 2024**. Submissions may take the form of traditional papers, performances, workshops, or installations, with presentations lasting 20 minutes plus 10 minutes for discussion. 
Since October 2023, we have been actively engaging in the LinkedIn universe, the world's largest professional network.



Florian Krauß: Television Drama from Germany: Production, Storytelling and "Quality" (Palgrave Studies in Screenwriting 2024)

This open access book examines how TV professionals in Germany have negotiated "quality TV drama" from 2015 to the present. As practitioners have adapted quality TV – a term most strongly associated with US series – to their own national context, they have simultaneously dealt with shifts in screenwriting and storytelling as well as with broader transformations of the local television industry. As in other European countries, in Germany this has included a crucial upheaval: the emergence of various streaming services, which has multiplied the television market. As a systematic study of this changing fiction industry, Television Drama from Germany will be of great interest to both academics and practitioners working both within and outside the German-language television market.



<u>Jan Černík: Perspective Subversion: Female Characters in</u> <u>František Daniel's Two Czech Films (Slovenské divadlo, 2024)</u>

In Frank Daniel's films we find two situations that do not seem to belong to his work. These are scenes from his first and last films, in which the perspective is reversed and for a brief moment we see a fictional world through female characters. The aim of the study is to show how both scenes stand out from the rest of the films and to try to explain how they can be seen in the context of Daniel's theory of narration. Methodologically, the paper combines an analysis of film form, work with archival sources and analysis of Daniel's theoretical books.
